
Historic Takoma, Inc. Celebrates 26 Years of Service to the Community 1979-2005

2005 House & Garden Tour, Sunday, May 1st

n Sunday May 1, this year's Takoma Park House and Garden tour celebrates spring by highlighting a diverse set of gardens along with the eclectic mix of houses that has been an annual tradition for 32 years.

Historic Takoma calls this year's tour "A Sylvan Suburb" in honor of founder B. F. Gilbert's favorite nickname for his community. This year, the Takoma Horticulture Club joined with Historic Takoma to identify gardeners willing to share their yards for the tour.

The tour runs from 1-5 pm and is designed for walking since the



dozen houses and gardens are in close proximity to each other. Tickets can be purchased in advance for \$15 at local Takoma merchants. On May 1, tickets will be sold for \$20 from a central ticket booth at the Takoma Park-Silver Spring Co-op (Carroll Avenue at Ethan Allen). The self-guided tour brochure and map, not made available until the day-of-tour, will be available at the ticket booth also for those who purchased tickets earlier.

unday December 5, 2004, turned out to be warm and balmy, a perfect afternoon for Historic Takoma's holiday party and annual meeting. Held at the richly decorated David-Warner Inn, HTI's annual meeting, convened by President Sabrina Baron, held elections, presented the annual Art McMurdie Restoration Award to Jerome Ernst, and celebrated the 25th anniversary of Historic Takoma.

President Sabrina Baron, Vice President Lorraine Pearsall and Secretary Caroline

Alderson were unanimously re-elected to a second one-year term as officers of the organization. John Current was elected to the office of Treasurer, also by unanimous vote. Incumbent Director Diana Kohn was unanimously re-elected to a three-year term. New Director Rachel Kennedy was also unanimously elected in absentia to the Board for a three-year term.

City Council Recognizes Historic Takoma's 25 Years of Service

embers of Takoma Park's City Council, led by Mayor Kathy Porter, passed a resolution expressing appreciation to Historic Takoma on December 6, 2004.

Past and present members of Historic Takoma joined the mayor, three of four original founders of Historic Takoma, and the City Council in celebrating Historic Takoma's 25 years of Service to the Takoma Park community.

The resolution highlighted the many significant contributions Historic Takoma has made over the years toward preserving and improving upon the quality of life in the community. These include:

- supporting "Operation Turnaround," one of the City's earliest programs to preserve historic structures;
- publishing walking tours, developing oral histories, seminars, exhibits and other events to document and promote the City's history;
- publishing the books, "Takoma Park: Portrait of a Victorian Suburb," and "Takoma Park A to Z: The Kids' Guide to the Town that Gilbert Built:"
- preserving and interpreting the historic Thomas-Siegler Carriage House and Gardens and the art deco gas station at Takoma junction;
- supporting the expansion of the Historic District in the City, helping to create the largest historic district in Montgomery County;
- incorporating in the District of Columbia to enhance the organization's efforts to coordinate activities of mutual interest to the two sister communities of Takoma, DC and Takoma Park, Maryland;
- helping to craft a compromise on the renovation of the Takoma Park, Maryland fire station which allows the station to remain at its current location; and,
- helping to negotiate the expansion of Montgomery College in a manner which set a precedent for establishing the jurisdiction of historic districts within Montgomery County and the state of Maryland.

Mayor Kathy Porter said she was not surprised at the large turnout that gathered and she congratulated Historic Takoma on their twenty-five years of service, as did Council Members Joy Austin-Lane, Bruce Williams and Heather Mizeur.

President Sabrina Baron thanked the Council and recognized the three founders present: Ellen Marsh, Loretta Neumann, and Roland Halstead. She noted that Phil Vogel, one of the original founders, passed away a few years ago. Former vice-president Loretta Neumann and past presidents Roland Halstead and Lorraine Pearsall, also thanked Ellen Marsh and others for their vision, their work on the Cady-Lee mansion, publishing the book, "Takoma Park, A Victorian Suburb," and as current vice-president Pearsall noted, because of their help the City survived the threats of the Montgomery College expansion, the North Central freeway and WMATA development.

Also speaking were DC ANC Commissioner Faith Wheeler and Julia O'Mally, Chair of the Montgomery County Historic Preservation Commission.

Art McMurdie Restoration Award

he annual Art McMurdie Restoration Award was presented to Jerome Ernst for his loving and ■ beautiful restoration of 7321 Takoma Avenue, which was badly damaged by fire. Jerry has preserved and restored several houses in our community, none more important than this one. It is certainly one of the first 70 houses completed in Takoma Park, and perhaps among the first 25 completed. Built in 1889, and once located across from the Cady-Lee mansion, it was moved in 1913 to its current location when the railroad underpass was built.

A handwritten note from Fanny G. Hodgson to Mrs. Rollinson Colburn, postmarked Baltimore, Maryland, and dated March 31, 1894. The Colburn family lived on Carroll Avenue, between Westmoreland and Columbia Avenue, where the gazebo now stands.

Several postcards of the Bliss Electrical School, located in north Takoma Park, and the Washington Sanitarium (now the Washington Adventist Hospital).



example, Georgetown, Dupont Circle and Greater U Street – you know they are affordable, a handy 6"x 9" size, and packed with photographs.

Entitled *Takoma Park Maryland* and *D.C.*, the new book will include approximately 200 photographs and images tracing the story of the community that B.F. Gilbert founded in 1883 from its "streetcar suburb" days all the way up to 2005. Over 100 years

of Fourth of July parades, the Adventists, a spiritualist or two, the Boys and Girls Club, the coming of the Metro, the Nuclear Free Zone, the Farmers' Market—it will all be there. Of course there will be buildings—from the proud Victorians to more modest bungalows, colonials, brick Cape Cods and the apartment buildings—even castoff trolley cars used as homes. You'll recognize some photos from the classic 1984 Takoma Park, Portrait of a Victorian Suburb,


Protecting Our Beloved Boundary Stone

he sandstone monument that marks the boundary between the District of Columbia and Maryland on Maple Ave./St. is one of 40 boundary stones placed in 1791-1792 at one-mile intervals to designate the original 'ten mile square' of the 'Federal District' as specified in the Constitution. That makes it one of the oldest local and national monuments!

Several years ago, Historic Takoma took the lead in replacing the iron fence after a truck damaged the one put in by the Daughters of the American Revolution in the early twentieth century. Since that time, Historic Takoma, working with nearby residents and the City of Takoma Park, has been taking steps to ensure the boundary stone's preservation, as well as educating residents and visitors about its history. HTI is seeking easements from the two owners of the properties on which the stone sits, with the intention of enhancing the landscape around the stone and creating a buffer. While the residential owners are willing, negotiations with the owner of the Maple Street Apartments have been more difficult. We appreciate the efforts of our attorney, Richard S. O'Connor in these negotiations. Meanwhile, Diana Kohn cites the boundary stone as a favorite stop on the Historic Takoma walking tours for both the general public and Takoma Park schoolchildren. Historic Takoma will use a grant from the Montgomery County Historic Preservation Commission to erect an interpretive sign telling the story of the marker in the near future.


