


Historic Takoma, Inc. Celebrates 27 Years of Service to the Community 1979-2006

Finally! A Permanent Home for HTI





n September 29, 2006, HTI took ownership of its new headquarters at 7328 Carroll Avenue, the heart of Takoma Junction. It has been a long journey over the last several years, but thanks to the hard work of HTI friends and volunteers, and state and local elected officials, Historic Takoma, Inc., raised \$50,000 from the State of Maryland in 2005, \$210,00 from the State the following year and a \$260,000 matching grant from Montgomery County in 2006. Our new home

was originally built in the 1930s as a Piggly Wiggly grocery store. In the 1940s it was converted to a roasting facility for Barcelona Nuts, still an on-going Maryland business concern headquartered in Baltimore. Packages of Barcelona Nuts are a feature of many local snack bars and convenience stores, and many Takoma Park residents still remember shopping for nuts at the Barcelona Nuts facility at the Carroll Avenue building, until the mid 1990s. Since then, the building has been intermittently

rented but mostly vacant. The challenge now for HTI is to take the building, which is currently essentially an empty shell, and decide how to turn it into useful space. We hope to have space for storing archival material, office space, meeting and classroom space as well as exhibit areas. There will be many volunteer opportunities as we go through the stages of designing, building and then making use of the new space. Huge Turnout at WMATA Compact Hearing on Proposed Metro Development

More than 150 people, from both Maryland and DC, attended the October 11 public hearing before the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA), held at Trinity Episcopal Church on Piney Branch Road, regarding the proposed EYA townhouse development at the Takoma Metro Station. More than 60 individuals testified at the hearing, and many more submitted written comments during the comment period. All but a small handful of speakers had serious reservations about the proposed Metro development project. HTI officers and members testified, as did Takoma Park Mayor, Kathy Porter, and all Takoma Park City Council members and the City attorney and other city staff members. HTI has been actively involved in this debate as part of the Friends of Takoma Transit group, including developing alternative development ideas and participating in an all day workshop on the issue held earlier this year. See: www.geociteis.com/takomafriends/FTT.html.

HTI, FTT and many area residents are concerned that the proposal on the table severely limits and impedes transit access and expansion at the site, unacceptably reduces existing open green space, reduces short term parking spaces available to community members, would provide too many badly planned townhouse units (each with a two car garage) and would be a financially unsound decision for WMATA. The hearing was a critical step in the process by which the WMATA Board of Directors, and other government bodies, including the Federal Transportation Authority, the DC Office of Planning and the Board on Zoning Authority, determine whether to reject, modify or approve a proposed development project at the site of the Takoma Metro Station.

products, such as a green roof, Zip Cars in the basement, and use of many recycled products and materials. Ecco Park strives to be a development of a different color: green. It will be a four-story glassand-stone building in NW, DC at Carroll & Maple Avenues, between Old Town and the Metro Station (former site of Penske rentals), consisting of 85 residential condominium units and 6000 square feet of retail space for small shops and restaurants. HTI has supported this project, which has obtained all necessary permits and approvals. Construction is expected to begin in the spring of 2007 and to be completed in 2008.



What's Happening in Takoma Park's Historic Districts

haping change to preserve the historic character of our community is one of Historic Takoma's most important functions. HTI reviews and advises the Montgomery County Preservation Commission and DC Historic Preservation Review Board on Historic Area Work Permits having a major impact on the district, testifies in Commission and Review Board hearings, and works with developers to encourage positive change that contributes to the economic vitality of the city while preserving its unique character. HTI also holds a seat on the Takoma Park Façade Advisory Board and Montgomery Preservation. Inc. Highlights of recent cases in which HTI has been active follow.

-- **Cady-Lee House** - The Cady-Lee is a fully restored nineteenth-century home on the National Register of Historic Places, located at 7064 Eastern Avenue, NW, Washington, DC, at the corner of Eastern Avenue and Piney Branch Road, just blocks from the heart of the Historic Takoma. The Cady-Lee is currently the home of the Forum for Youth Investment, a nonprofit organization, but the Forum may not be able to remain in this stately home. If they leave, it is essential to find a new suitable owner who will properly appreciate and maintain this Takoma treasure.

-- **Thomas-Siegler Carriage House** - Many thanks the City Gardener and the City of Takoma Park for recently providing serious maintenance work on the Carriage House grounds. The Carriage House stands on the grounds of the Thomas-Siegler house, built in 1884, the first house to be completed in Takoma Park. In 1984 development threatened the property, but new owners purchased the main house, although they divided it into two separate living quarters. The Carriage House and surrounding garden were rescued by the Trust for Public Land, which bought the property and re-sold it in 1985 to the City of Takoma Park, which used Maryland Program Open Space funds to complete the purchase. The original house continues to be occupied by private owners, and the City retains ownership of the rest of the property. Through an agreement with the City, Historic Takoma manages the city-owned portion of the property for public use. In 1995, Historic Takoma opened the Thomas-Siegler Carriage House Museum on the site. The Carriage House and grounds are particularly lovely in the spring. Did You Know, One Hundred Years Ago in 1906 ...

38 people died in a train collision at the edge of Takoma Park at the Terra Cotta Station, part of the Metropolitan line which stopped at Lamond Station from 1873 to 1922. From its original situation at Brightwood (or Takoma), a three-sided shed was shifted to Lamond, and stood on the west side of the tracks close to Whittier Street where it crossed the tracks. The closest store for some early Brightwood residents was reported to have been near here on Blair Road. Angus Lamond, Sr., established a successful terra cotta tile works on land he owned near the line, giving the station its name.




