2007 House & Garden Tour, Sunday, May 6th

unday May 6 is the date of the 34th Annual Takoma Park House and Garden Tour. The theme of this year's tour is "Carroll Connections" and it will feature homes and gardens along and near Carroll Avenue between Takoma **Junction** (where Carroll and Ethan Allen Avenues intersect) and Lincoln Avenue. There are many Carroll Connections, including that this is the neighborhood in which the new Historic

Takoma building is located. Have you ever wondered where Carroll Avenue and Manor Circle got their names? It was on Manor Circle, just off what is now Carroll Avenue, that General Samuel Sprigg Carroll, an area resident whose tenure predated the founding of the city of

Takoma Park, built his home. The oldest house in Takoma Park, on what was once part of General Carroll's property, will be on this year's Tour. Today the neighborhood includes bungalows, colonials and foursquare style houses, along with more recent construction.


The Tour runs from 1-5 pm. Tickets are \$15 if purchased in advance (available at American Craft, Mark's Kitchen, Now and Then, and the Co-op), and \$20 on the date of the tour itself. Approximately a dozen homes and /or gardens are included, and are in close proximity to each other for this self-guided walking tour. Morrison Park, across from the TPSS Co-Op at the intersection of Carroll and Ethan Allen.

Progress on Improvements to HTI's New Building

haping change to preserve the historic character of our community is one of Historic Takoma's most important functions. HTI reviews and advises the Montgomery County MD Preservation Commission and the DC Historic Preservation Review Board on Historic Area Work Permits having a major impact on the districts; testifies in Commission and Review Board hearings; and works with developers to encourage positive change that contributes to the economic vitality of the city while preserving its unique character. HTI also holds a seat on the Takoma Park Façade Advisory Board, Montgomery Preservation. Inc.; the board of directors of the Old Takoma Business Association; and the advisory Board of SafeTakoma. Highlights of recent matters in which HTI has been active follow.

Preservation of Historic Windows in Four Houses on Piney Branch Road NW - HTI joined two of its DC members in working with the Takoma Park Baptist Church to ensure the restoration, rather than replacement, of over one-third of the historic windows in four rental houses owned by the Church. Many of the homes' wood-frame windows have the original glass, including some art glass, and many have unusual configurations. HTI has donated \$5,000 to the Takoma Park Baptist Church towards the cost of window restoration and repair. The Church had been granted a permit to replace all of

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the windows in the four houses, but has agreed to restore a substantial number of them instead. HTI, along with national window experts, believes that it is no more costly to repair original windows than to replace them. Repair is important to preserve the rich period character of the houses. As a result of reviewing this matter, the District of Columbia Historic Preservation Office has now clarified that, in the future, it will not consider fibrex (composed of 60% plastic) windows to be "wood windows" for the purposes of window replacement in DC historic districts.

Douglas Development Project (Willow and Maple Streets, NW) - This project includes two buildings, each containing 40 residential units, proposed for the now-vacant field between Willow and Maple Streets, NW, behind the CVS. HTI offered testimony at a public hearing before the Historic Preservation Review Board in January, generally supporting the project, while continuing to make constructive suggestions, including a request to lower the elevation of the south end of the proposed structure (several levels have already been reduced), mitigating the design of the elevator shaft and requesting as much green space be preserved as possible. The DC Historic Preservation Review Board has approved the concept design for this project, and has directed its staff to work with the community on the details.

Urciolo Project on Laurel Avenue - Discussions continue regarding this in-fill project proposed for Laurel Avenue near the corner of Eastern Avenue. The proposal calls for mixed use retail/restaurant, and a redesigned parking area with a driveway entrance on Laurel Avenue and an exit onto Eastern.

Takoma Theater - The owner of the historic Takoma Theater at 4th and Butternut Streets, NW, has filed an application with the DC Historic Preservation Office to raze (demolish) the building. The Takoma Theater is a very important building in the Takoma Park Historic District and in the Takoma community. It was designed by a prominent theater designer of the early twentieth century, John Jacob Zink. Zink was the lead architect on 23 theaters in DC, MD, and VA. Of the 23, only 7 remain as viable theaters, including the Tivoli in Frederick, MD; the Senator and the Patterson in Baltimore, MD; and the Uptown in DC. The Takoma is the only untouched, unrenovated survivor of the 23 Zink designs in the area. Its original interior and fantastic acoustics are amazing, and it is the only theater to have the roof sign with its name still intact. Theater historians have recognized its significance for some time. The Theater is an important cultural icon in this community, and lots of folks have worked over the years to revitalize the theater as an arts center for the neighborhood, for the city, and indeed for the region. A vital performance venue such as the theater would be an important spark to the community, and an important element of the MainStreet program that seeks to revitalize the Takoma commercial corridor from Takoma Junction in the MD neighborhood to the theater in the DC neighborhood. A working group of representatives from neighborhood organizations is searching for ways to make sure the theater continues to be an important historic and cultural resource for Takoma. HTI, TDCNA, former TTAP Board members, the Old Takoma Business Association, ANCs 4B01 and 4B02, and a representative of the DC Preservation League have been involved in this effort. Historic Takoma's Board voted unanimously to oppose the demolition of the theater. (Thanks to John Hume for information contained in this story).



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
